What's Blooming in November

Aster, Autumn Flowering Cherry (Prunus 'autumnalis') Camellia sasanqua, Camellia senensis, Chrysanthemums, Confederate Rose (Hibiscus mutabilis), Cyclamen, Dandelion, Eleagnus, Eupatorium, Fall Crocus, False Holly (Mahonia), Fatsia japonica, Fragrant Tea Olive (Osmanthus). Ginger Lily (Hedychium coronarium), Goldenrod, Gourds, Heather (Erica Joe-Pye Weed. carnea). Knapweed (Centaurea). Knotweed, Lantana, Leadwort (Ceratostigma plumbaginoides), (Eriobotrya japonica), Marigold, Marjoram, all the Mints, Morning Glory, Oregano, Pansies, Pincushion Flower (Scabiosa) Plectranthus, Pumpkin, Rosemary. SOUTHEAST VA BEEKEEPER "YARD NOTES"



November

Your hives should be heavy with stores, at least 60 lbs. If not, continue to feed any light hives with sugar syrup. For fall and winter feeding, an easy rule of thumb for small batches of syrup is 1 cup of water for 1 pound of sugar. Remember, if there's too much water, the bees will have to work hard to evaporate it to the proper consistency. That's why we make it thick at this time of the year.

Moisture, not cold, is the leading cause of problems in the winter hive. Do not allow moisture to condense on the hive top and drip onto the cluster of bees below. Be sure to leave the screened bottom board open to improve ventilation; a hive stand works nicely as a skirt to block winds from blowing into the hive bottom. Allow for moist air to escape at the top of the hive by propping up the telescoping top, but anchor the top with a brick or other heavy object to keep it in place during winter storms. A mouse guard or entrance reducer is also recommended.

If you do not have a subscription to one of the bee magazines, consider subscribing. Use the winter off-season to read and be ready to implement your new knowledge in the spring.

Order, assemble and paint any woodenware you will require for the 2016 season. In just a few short months you will be busy with a new beekeeping year!
